## National Survey of Early Care and Education

- An integrated set of surveys conducted in 2012 with
  - Households with children under 13
  - Home-based providers providing early care and education to children under 13
  - Center-based programs providing early care and education to children not yet in kindergarten
  - Center-based classroom-assigned staff.
- Sponsored by Office of Planning, Research and Evaluation, Administration for Children and Families, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services





### About providers and children enrolled

Type of Provider	Number of Providers	Number of Children age 0-5
Center-based*	129,000	6,980,000
Listed Home-based	118,000	751,000
Unlisted, Paid Home-based	919,000	2,340,000
Unlisted, Unpaid Home-based	2,730,000	4,060,000

<sup>\* 1,000,000</sup> teachers and caregivers work in center-based ECE programs.





# Just under half of center-based teachers and caregivers of preschoolers have a bachelors degree or higher.



Center-based workforce serving children ages 3-5






45% college degree or higher


