- What are the expectations for the ways in which early care and education programs and providers should interact with families to meet their needs?


What constitutes higher quality in this area? How can it be measured?



Brief Research Questions

- How do QRIS indicators for family partnerships align with the constructs of family-sensitive care?
- What are some of the challenges that QRIS face in measuring or monitoring family partnership indicators?
- What are some of the challenges providers and programs face and their needs for support in meeting family partnership indicators, particularly those that focus on family-sensitive practices?
- What other approaches could states use within the context of QRIS to help families find early care and education arrangements that are family-sensitive?

Methods

- Review of family partnership indicators in existing QRIS using a recent Compendium (OPRE, ACF, 2010)
- Review specific QRIS language for 4 indicators:
 - □ written communication
 - □ parent surveys
 - □ activities with families
 - □ community resource lists
- Independent coding for promising indicators and selected examples (3 coders)
- Interviews with selected QRIS administrators

- Research on provider/program views of familysensitive practices and how providers/programs engage families.
- Develop innovative and realistic approaches to measure exchange of information between parents and providers; program/provider sensitivity to families, and family engagement:
 - □ Observations
 - □ Record or portfolio review
 - □ Provider/parent surveys



Directions for QRIS Supports for Programs and Providers

- Enhance staff preparation for working with families.
- Provide options to enable programs and providers to meet the indicators.
- Provide information to parents about characteristics of sensitive & responsive care without using it to determine a rating.
