
Purpose of the study


Methods

Sample


- Families living in Minnesota who currently receive financial assistance for child care
- Families were surveyed two separate times:




Families' perceptions of whether financial assistance increased the number of child care options




Families who pay out-of-pocket expenses



Average cost of out-of-pocket expenses per month




Families who marked cost factors as "Crucially important"



Provider accepts subsidy Costs are within my ideal Provider offers financial Cost information is easily budget aid accessible

Families who marked "provider offers financial aid" as "Crucially important"





When asked the primary reason they selected their provider,

30% of families

reported that it was because the provider accepted subsidy

Other common primary reasons were: Facility is within driving distance (7%) Use of quality learning activities or curricula (5%) Cost is within the family's budget (5%) Child can spend time with other children their age (4%)

What receiving financial assistance means to families

Theme	%	Example quote	Other themes that emerged
Allowed parents to maintain employment	38%	"Receiving the grant makes it possible for us to work. If we did not receive the grant, the cost of daycare would be more than one parent's income."	 included: Allowing parents to attend school Affording families financial stability and assisting with living expenses Decreasing stress Allowing some families to keep their housing Challenges of affording child care and navigating system
Appreciation for program	27%	"Everything. Truly, it has meant everything. I am more appreciative of these programs than anyone could know. Thank you to whomever makes sure they are in place. Bless."	
Child receives high- quality education	13%	"It's allowed me to enroll my child in a center that offers languages and other enrichment activities that he may not be offered in another care	

Summary and Implications

- For the majority of families, financial assistance does not change their perception of the number of child care options available to them
- While financial assistance programs help mitigate costs, families still pay significant out-of-pocket expenses
- Cost is a crucially important factor to many families and may be the primary reason a family selects a certain provider
- Families view financial assistance as vitally important to them and their children
