Introduction

The Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) is the primary Federal program specifically devoted to child care services and quality improvements in the child care arena. CCDF provides approximately \$5 billion in block grants to States, Territories, and Tribes to subsidize the cost of child care for low-income working parents. CCDF funding also helps deliver early and school-age care and education services to more than 1.6 million children in the United States each month, helping increase their school readiness and improve their school performance.

States and Territories have significant flexibility under CCDF to develop child care policies and programs that best suit the needs of children and parents. However, they must also spend at least 4 percent of their CCDF funds to improve the quality of care. States and Territories do this through a variety of activities, such as implementing professional development plans, promoting inclusive child care, and giving grants and loans to providers. In addition, CCDF stipulates that specially targeted funds must be used for quality improvement, school-age care, resource and referral services, and services to infants and toddlers.

In addition, in February 2009, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act provided an additional \$2 billion to CCDF, which has helped States, Territories, and Tribes reach more children and families with child care financial assistance, support child care providers to reach higher levels of quality, and offer providers more professional development opportunities.

Purpose of This Report

States and Territories must submit a biennial plan as part of the process of applying for CCDF funds. Lead Agencies submitted CCDF Plans for Fiscal Years (FY) 2010–2011 on July 1, 2009, that were approved to take effect October 1, 2009. The *Child Care and Development Fund Report of State and Territory Plans FY 2010–2011* summarizes CCDF Plans as approved by the Child Care Bureau and provides an overview of efforts planned by States and Territories at the beginning of FY 2010.

Report Development

This report was prepared by the National Child Care Information and Technical Assistance Center (NCCIC) in partnership with staff from the Child Care Bureau. NCCIC compiled data reported in approved CCDF Plans and relevant attachments submitted by Lead Agencies for a selected number of questions.

The information presented reflects some of the activities and strategies States and Territories planned to undertake as presented in the approved CCDF Plans. This report is not a catalog of all activities undertaken by Lead Agencies since States and Territories might not have included all activities in

their CCDF Plans, which also may be amended at any time during the biennial period. In addition, this report includes some text taken directly from CCDF Plans, so certain terminology may differ in particular parts of the report given variations across States and Territories.

Information is provided from 51 States and 5 Territories. For the purpose of this report, the District of Columbia is categorized as a State. The five Territories are American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. Nearly all data in the tables and figures present combined information from States and Territories, rather than separate counts for each.

Report Format

The report includes two main sections (“Chapter 2: CCDF Plans Data Summary” and “Chapter 3: CCDF State and Territory Profiles”). The second chapter is a summary of selected data from all 56 Lead Agencies about how they comply with CCDF statute and Federal regulations, which corresponds to the CCDF Plan Preprint (Form ACF-118).¹ Information is presented in table and figure format.

The third chapter highlights selected services and activities through profiles of all States and Territories. These profiles present key information from the approved CCDF Plans about how the program is administered and implemented; eligibility criteria, reimbursement rates, and sliding fee scales; health and safety requirements; and selected activities to improve the quality of child care. These profiles provide examples for illustrative purposes as a supplement to the information presented in the second chapter.

CCDF Plans Data Summary

This chapter contains data that highlight selected services and activities as reported by all 56 Lead Agencies in their approved Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) Plans for Fiscal Years (FY) 2010–2011, which became effective October 1, 2009. Data are expressed in tables and figures, which correspond to questions from parts 1 through 7 of CCDF Plan Preprint. Information covers the following State and Territory activities and services:

- Administering and coordinating CCDF, including types of entities responsible for activities;
- Establishing emergency preparedness and response plans for child care and early childhood programs;
- Making a full range of providers available to all families through grants, contracts, and certificates;
- Establishing eligibility requirements and priorities for services, payment rates, and sliding fee scales;
- Establishing periodic reviews of eligibility for families participating in the CCDF program;
- Funding activities to improve quality, such as providing comprehensive consumer education to parents, professional development opportunities and other activities for the workforce, supporting quality rating and improvement systems, and developing and implementing early learning guidelines; and
- Establishing health and safety requirements and enforcement strategies for providers serving children receiving child care assistance through CCDF.

Table 1 shows which types of agencies are responsible for implementing different types of services, programs, and activities funded through the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF). A non-governmental entity is a private or non-profit organization such as Child Care Resource and Referral Agencies.

The other States and Territories require the parent to select a provider before the certificate is issued.

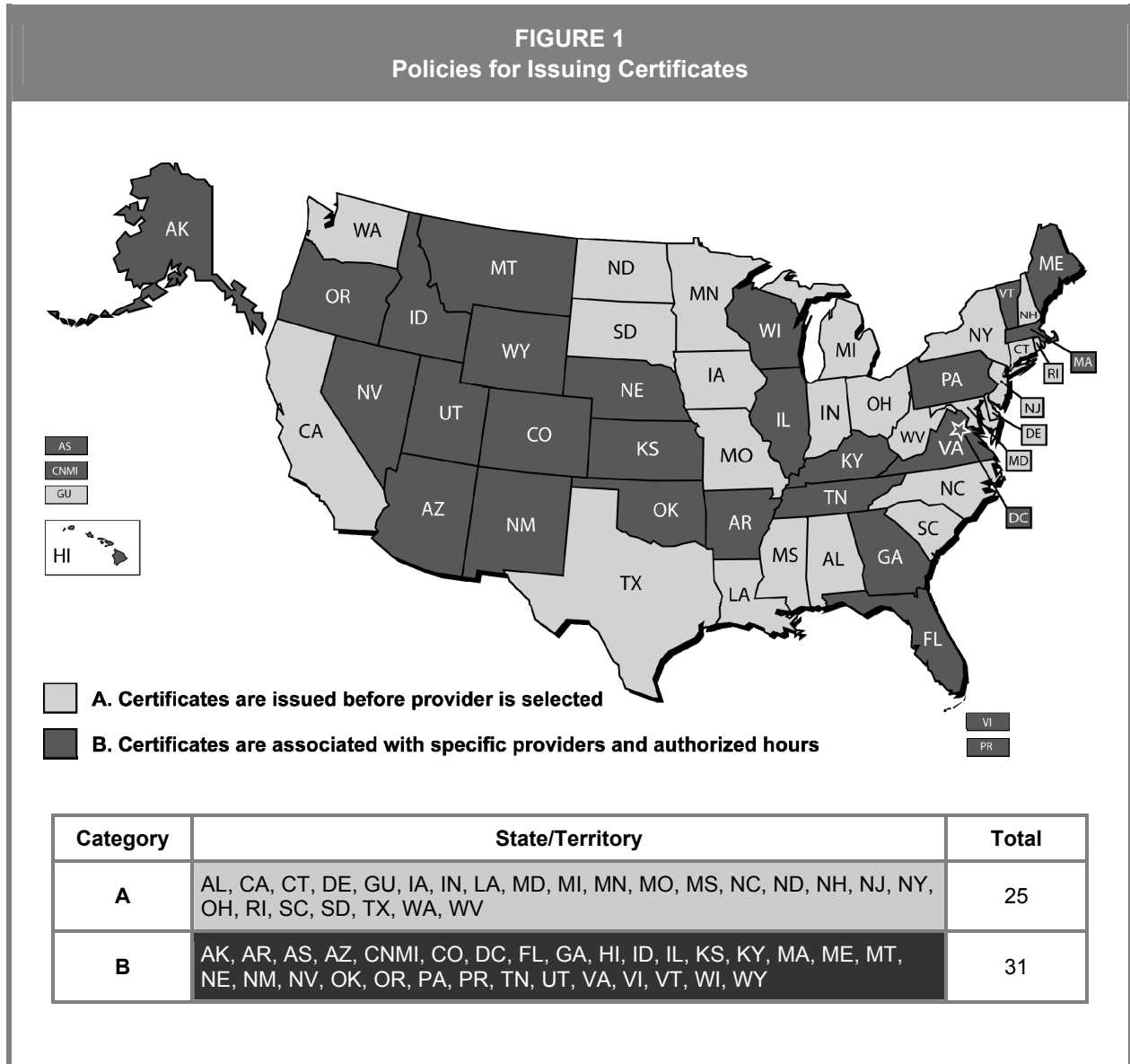

*Alabama, American Samoa, Arizona, Connecticut, Hawaii, Idaho, Iowa, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, New York, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, West Virginia, and Wisconsin establish separate rates for family child care providers and group-home child care. In Alaska, Connecticut, Georgia, Mississippi, North Dakota, and South Dakota, group-home child care rates are the same as center-based rates. In Vermont and the Virgin Islands, family child care rates are the same as the center-based rates. In addition, some Lead Agencies establish separate rates for license-exempt family child care providers. Others establish additional family child care rates based on tiered quality levels.

Table 8 shows the States and Territories that use the current Market Rate Survey (MRS) to establish rates, have tiered rates, and allow providers to charge more than the payment rate. It also shows payment rates as they compare to current MRS. Nineteen States and Territories use their current MRS to set rates. Forty-three States and Territories have tiered reimbursement rates. Of those, 34 have such rates for higher quality care, 26 have rates for special needs care, 10 have rates for nontraditional care, 6 have rates for infant care, and 4 have rates for other types of care. In addition, 44 States and Territories allow providers to charge parents the difference between reimbursement rates and their fees.

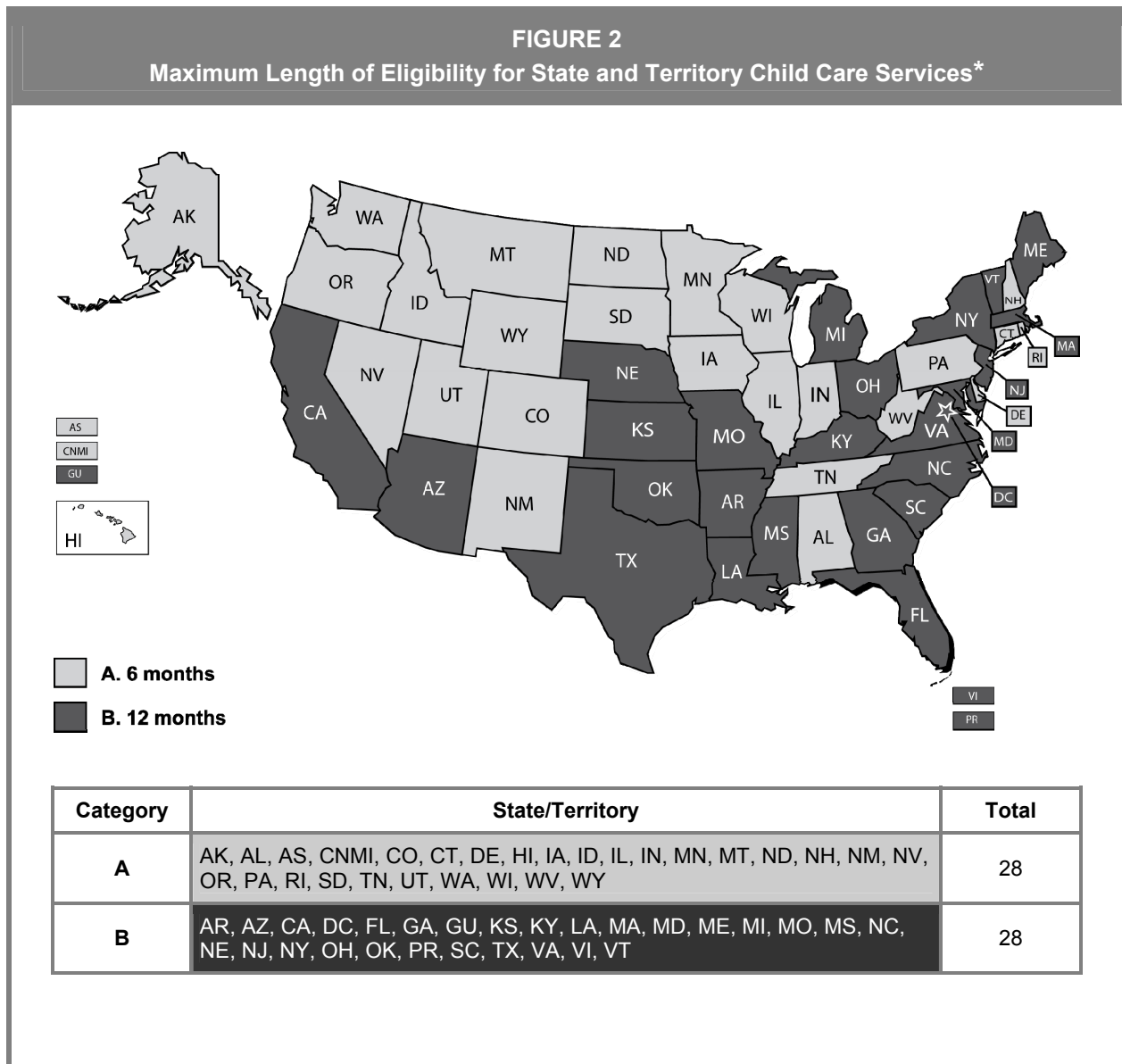

CCDF State and Territory Profiles

This chapter contains a profile of each State and Territory that highlights selected services and activities as reported by Lead Agencies in their approved Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) Plans for Fiscal Years (FY) 2010–2011, which became effective October 1, 2009.

As a supplement to the selected tables and figures presented in the second chapter of the report, the data selected for these profiles correspond to the CCDF Plan Preprint under the following broad headings:

- **Administration and Implementation**, which is drawn from *Part 1 – Administration* and *Part 3 – Child Care Services Offered*.
- **Child Care Services Offered**, which is drawn from *Part 3 – Child Care Services Offered* and *Part 4 – Parental Rights and Responsibilities*.
- **Health and Safety Requirements**, which is drawn from *Part 6 – Health and Safety Requirements for Providers* (for States) and *Part 7 – Health and Safety Requirements in the Territories* (for Territories).
- **Selected Quality Initiatives**, which is drawn from *Part 5 – Activities and Services to Improve the Quality and Availability of Child Care*.

Due to the wide variation in how States and Territories implement the CCDF program, data were selected in order to present the information as consistently as possible. In addition, these profiles do not provide a comprehensive picture of the CCDF program in each State and Territory. Under **Administration and Implementation**, *administration of the program* covers the majority of entities and methods involved in delivering CCDF services, although States and Territories vary widely in how the program is implemented.

Under **Child Care Services Offered**, the *income eligibility* information is based on entry into the program, not the maximum income limit for remaining eligible. The *reimbursement rates* for full-time care in the largest urban area are presented, which may or may not be representative of all possible rates. The *sliding fees* for full-time care for a family of three are presented. The waiting list information is based on responses to a series of yes/no questions, although States and Territories vary in their reasons for use and how they implement waiting lists. The *maximum length of eligibility upon initial authorization* for most families is presented, although the actual length of eligibility may vary within a State or Territory based on client needs or location of services.

Under **Health and Safety Requirements**, information about which provider types are subject to licensing is presented. Also included is information about exemptions for relatives and enforcement strategies.

Under **Selected Quality Activities**, examples highlight only one of many activities each State and Territory undertakes for each category.
